County of **LOS Angeles** Better than Average

Los Angeles County allocated a good portion of its budget to treatment, and is using pre-existing, community treatment assessment centers as an integral part of their implementation plan. Unfortunately, the largest and most diverse county in the state did not adequately incorporate community and consumer input into the planning process.





While treatment services offered in Los Angeles are broad, those programs included in the implementation plan are not diverse enough to serve all of the affected communities.

While implementation task force meetings were officially open to the public in Los Angeles, they were not advertised, nor were a diverse range of voices solicited. The county's implementation task force was chaired and dominated by criminal justice professionals, rather than public health officials.
